From the President

It is with immense pride that I join Scott in presenting our annual report for 2023. Spectrum has achieved remarkable growth, both in numbers and impact, in the seven years that I've served on the board. We've grown from seven or eight board members with a vision and very little budget to a leading 2SLGBTOIA+ resource that is now embodying its mission of serving, affirming, and 2SLGBTQIA+ supporting the well-being of individuals in Waterloo Region. We still have much to do and learn as we work alongside our Black, Indiaenous, and racialized siblings in providing a safe space, education, and resources in the Region and I look forward to taking that journey together.

Our community has made great strides since the turn of the 21st century in gaining the rights and responsibilities that have been denied to us for decades. However, we can never become complacent. Legislation in the United States explicitly stripping away these rights from our community and rampant explicit transphobia throughout the world have made it evident that organizations like Spectrum are not just relevant but essential. We have to be ever vigilant in stopping the spread of misinformation and hate.

Spectrum has thrived under the leadership of its Executive Director Scott Williams and staff, our current board, and especially our amazing volunteers. The hard work put forth by everyone has resulted in a growing awareness in the region that Spectrum is here to advocate, listen, represent, and educate.

As we reflect on our journey, let's celebrate our achievements and the strides we've made. With gratitude to our staff, volunteers, donors, and allies, we look forward to an even brighter future.

From the Executive Director

Since our last annual report, we have continued to focus on capacity building whilst developing new and different programs based on what the community has asked us for.

We have had a special focus on engaging with Black, Indigenous, and racialized (BIR) 2SLGBTQIA+ people. You can read more about this work in the pages that follow. We'll soon be starting new programming that is by BIR people, for BIR people!

Starting in January 2023, we brought our second full-time employee aboard! Fabian Fletcher has stepped into the role of Volunteer and Operations Manager. Spectrum has 51 active volunteers at the moment and Fabian helps to coordinate all of their activities to make our programs happen.

In February 2023, we brought our third full-time employee aboard! Rea Cavers is our Youth Under the Rainbow Program Coordinator. You'll read more about that work in this report as well.

This spring, Statistics Canada's hate crimes report noted that in 2021 there was a 64% rise in crimes against members of 2SLGBTQIA+ communities. We have certainly experienced a rise in hate and violence locally. We are also seeing elected officials enact policies across Canada that will threaten the lives of trans and non-binary youth. In the face of this hate, Spectrum will continue to be visible and work towards our vision of a more inclusive community.

I'd like to thank all of our incredible volunteers and employees for their work this year. In this report, we're excited to share about the impact we've had this year.

SPECTRUM acknowledges the truth that we are situated on the Haldimand Tract, which is the land of the Haudenosaunee and Mississauga Anishinaabe nations. It is also the traditional territory of the Chinonton People who were entirely eliminated by the colonisation of this land.

The land on which we meet, live, love, and work is land that was originally shared with open arms by the Indigenous peoples who have always called this place home with the settlers of this region. We recognise that our presence here has disrupted thousands of years of culture and belonging. The very land upon which the SPECTRUM space exists is at the edge of a great wetland that served as a hunting ground and overwintering space, and is no more than a short distance from villages, feast and ceremony arounds, and settlements.

Indigenous Peoples of this land recognise Two-Spirit as a sacred way of being, an individual who carries in them the medicines and teaching of many genders and sexualities. We recognise that this traditional regard for Two-Spirit peoples has set them apart in their knowledge but also that they have been always regarded as important, respected, and fully accepted members of their communities. We recognise that the histories and teachings of Two-Spirit peoples have always influenced and added to Indigenous ways of knowing.

This territorial acknowledgement alone cannot accomplish justice and we are committed to working towards reconciliation and ensuring that our programs, services, and practices are culturally relevant and accessible to Indigenous peoples in our community.

This territorial acknowledgment was drafted in consultation with a paid Indigenous Two-Spirit consultant, Terre Chartrand.

Strategic Priorities

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

This year, we have continued our EDI journey. In the following pages, you'll read about some of the training our people have taken and about the work we've been doing to better understand the needs of all members of 2SLGBTQIA+ communities.

Our EDI Committee has done excellent work in revising and developing new policies and procedures to help Spectrum become more equitable in the ways we work to deliver programming and the ways we support our personnel.

Leadership and People Development

Our Board of Directors has worked especially hard this year, continuing our transition from having a working board to a governance board. They have put in many extra hours to participate in professional development opportunities that are helping to strengthen the organization.

Financial Sustainability

Financial Sustainability is critical to our being able to provide meaningful programs and services in the long-term. We were pleased to work with The Fundraising Lab this year to help us improve our fundraising efforts and, as you'll see later in this report, various fundraising events, and grant applications have made it possible for us to do more than ever before. Thank you so much to our generous donors and sponsors for your support.

Spectrum plans to be here for decades to come. That is why we've established an endowment fund at Waterloo Region Community Foundation. You'll read more about this later.

Communications and Collaboration

Communications and Collaboration have been an important priority for us this year. We have worked to build and strengthen our relationships with many other local organizations. This has often resulted in partnerships that have increased the capacity of organizations across the community to serve 2SLGBTQIA+ people. especially excited by collaborations with Camino Wellbeing + Mental Health, Kitchener Public Library, Waterloo Public Library, Idea Exchange, Region of Waterloo Library, Kinbridge Community Association, ACCKWA, Wilfrid Laurier University's Faculty of Social Work, Community Justice Initiatives, Rad Riot Books, Family and Children's Services of the Waterloo Region, Rainbow Coalition of Waterloo Region, tri-Pride Community THEMUSEUM. and Association. members of the Enchanté Network.

We've also been privileged to work with many new partners to provide Rainbow Diversity Training to their personnel. We strongly believe that this program is contributing to a safer and more welcoming community for 2SLGBTQIA+ people.

Finally, we've worked to build relationships with our elected officials at all levels. We're grateful to those who have engaged with us to learn about the issues facing 2SLGBTQIA+ people and help us address them.

We've just started our new strategic planning cycle which will help us build a plan for 2024-2027. Stay tuned for opportunities to engage with us!

Spotlight on Rainbow Diversity Training

Spectrum's Rainbow Diversity Training has become one of our most sought-after and successful services. We have a series of two-hour workshops on 2SLGBTQIA+ cultural competency that we offer to organizations, businesses, and individuals to help them better understand the issues facing the rainbow community and how to be allies.

In our 2022-2023 year, our team of seven facilitators delivered training to 1,923 participants in 95 individual workshops.

Region of Waterloo Upstream Funding

Spectrum is grateful to have received a two-year grant from the Region of Waterloo Upstream Fund. These funds allowed us to hire part-time co-facilitators to run our weekly peer support group for 2SLGBTQIA+ youth aged 18-25, and our monthly discussion group for 2SLGBTQIA+ young adults aged 25-40. The grant has also allowed us to provide free Rainbow Diversity Training sessions for the community each month.



Our weekly youth group provides a space for 2SLGBTQIA+ individuals aged 18-25 to build community, and increase their sense of belonging and wellness. The peer support format offers a special dynamic where the two co-facilitators and participants can all connect on their shared identities, as well as learn from one another's unique lived experiences.

When the youth group first started running in 2021, the majority of meetings were held virtually due to COVID-19 safety protocols. When it became safe to hold the group inperson again, the co-facilitators witnessed the importance of coming together in the same space whenever possible. The group now always offers a hybrid model where participants can continue to join virtually, allowing valued facetime to happen, while still providing an option for folks to stay connected when they can't physically be there. Special thanks to the City of Kitchener Downtown Community Centre for providing meeting space for this group).

Discussions in the youth group range from favourite TV shows for queer representation, to difficulties someone may be going through in their interpersonal relationships. The group offers a versatile space where participants can bond over both the joys and challenges of the queer experience. The intention is to facilitate a safe(r) space that folks can bring their whole, complex selves to. When one person becomes comfortable sharing nuanced parts of themself, this often shows other participants that they are not alone in their experiences. At the same time, it is also completely okay for folks to listen and enjoy being in the space, without sharing anything if they'd prefer not to.

Most weeks we're joined by participants who have been attending the group regularly for over a year, in combination with new faces who have recently decided to get out of their comfort zone — making it feel like the community is continuing to grow and come together. Anna, one of the co-facilitators shared, "It's been really special seeing how participants become more comfortable with one another over the weeks. The same applies to the ways they support one another, whether by sharing relatable experiences or validating each other's feelings. Several folks have mentioned that they've also started attending other peer support groups at Spectrum since joining the youth group, and they've been able to find their people through these avenues."

Capacity-Building Update

Spectrum was grateful to receive an extension of the LGBTQ2 Community Capacity Fund grant administered by Women and Gender Equality Canada. With these funds, we focused on:

- Training
- Community Engagement
- Databases
- Fund Development

Our Board and ED participated in Foundations of Equity, and Anti-Black Racism trainings with the KOJO Institute. Some staff and board members participated in Capacity Canada's Board Boot Camp. Our ED spent 10 months in Leadership Waterloo Region's core program, graduating in the class of 2023. Our Board and ED participated in three educational circles with Community Justice Initiatives to help us better understand restorative justice practices.

We engaged with members of Black, Indigenous, and racialized (BIR) communities through an environmental scan, interviews with individuals and organizations, a survey, and four community conversations (These took place on January 10, January, 17, January 24, and March 14, 2023.) which helped us along the path to better understanding the needs of 2SLGBTQIA+ BIR people.



This work resulted in a report that includes a series of recommendations for Spectrum to review and work on going forward. The report was also shared with the community in the hopes that it might help other organizations as well. We're grateful to all the community members who engaged with us during this project. This represents the first step in this work for us and we look forward to serving you better.

We upgraded our online Rainbow Pages and TransNAV GPS databases, and created a new online catalogue for our lending library. Finally, we worked with the Fundraising Lab to further improve our fund development efforts.







Sport Canada Innovation

One of our most successful programs over the past year has been our 2SLGBTQIA+ Multi-Sport Drop-In. This is currently offered at both the Downtown Community Centre and Stanley Park Community Centre in Kitchener, and at Kinbridge in Cambridge.

It's an opportunity for queer folks to get together and play sports in an environment where they can be truly themselves.





We were grateful to have received a two-year grant from Sport Canada that allowed us to hire a part-time Sports Coordinator as well as co-facilitators for this program. It also allowed us to provide Rainbow Diversity Training to many City of Kitchener employees. In addition, the funding allows us to work with the Faculty of Social Work at Wilfrid Laurier University to conduct a robust evaluation of this program -- both the drop-in itself, and our training. We look forward to being able to share the findings next year.

Lyle S. Hallman Foundation Children's Initiatives Grant

Until recently, all of Spectrum's programs have been for 2SLGBTQIA+ adults aged 18+. Parents and caregivers told us there was a need for programming for 2SLGBTQIA+ children under age 12. We applied for a Children's Initiatives Grant from the Lyle S. Hallman Foundation and are grateful to be receiving \$152,493 over two years to deliver Youth and Families Under the Rainbow programming.

This grant allowed us to hire a full-time project coordinator who works with Kitchener Public Library, Waterloo Public Library, Idea Exchange, Region of Waterloo Library, and Artshine to provide arts and storytime programs for children aged 4-12. Over the course of the two-year project, we will deliver programming in all 24 library branches across the region!

Youth Under the Rainbow gives 2SLGBTQIA+ children and allies a chance to meet other children who might share parts of their identity. The program will help these children find community and improve their sense of belonging while having fun!













Endowment Fund

In December 2022 we launched Spectrum's Rainbow Community Fund!

This endowment fund is one of over 400 funds held by Waterloo Region Community Foundation (WRCF). These funds generate income that is then distributed to support a broad range of charitable causes within our community.

The fund launched with an investment of \$5,000 with the goal of helping to provide financial stability to Spectrum in the long-term.

"We are very pleased to be able to support Spectrum as they work to build up the resources to deliver programming in the community to meet current and future needs," says Eric Avner, President & CEO, Waterloo Region Community Foundation. "Endowment funds like this help us work towards our vision of a sustainable, equitable, thriving community."

January 25, 2023 - CRA Benefits and Credits for 2SLGBTQIA+ Seniors

As a precursor to our Pride month Robin's Nest Revisited event, on February 22, 2023 we held a Community Conversation with Youth About Robin's Nest Documentary. This was a wonderful opportunity for older adults to learn from younger folks about queer spaces and how they meet one another in a community without a gay bar.

Board members Tom Connelly and Brooklin Wallis dropped the puck at the February 24, 2023 Kitchener Rangers You Can Play game.

The need for 2SLGBTQIA+-affirming foster families in our community is great, so on March 21, 2023 we hosted an information night with Family and Children's Services.

On March 22 and 29, 2023 we held Community Conversations with Waterloo Region Family Network on Developing Supports for the Trans-Autism Community. This were very informative sessions which have resulted in a report that will be released soon.

For the International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia and Transphobia on May 17, 2023 we collaborated with the Cambridge Art Galleries to provide a talk by Adam Barbu called We Are Numerous: Art and Trans Multiplicity.

On April 25, 2023, we hosted a panel on Experiences of Queer Post-Secondary Students with participants from Conestoga College, Wilfrid Laurier University, University of Waterloo, and McMaster University. This was a helpful event for students considering post-secondary education in the fall.

June 3, 2023 – 6-10pm – TWB Brewing Beer Launch Pride Patio Party


